

# **Term 3 Environmental Highlights**



So Term 3's environmental initiatives started off with a new recycling action that the WEN Student team likes to call Texta Turnaround. This initiative is supported by **Officeworks "Bring It Back"** program.





This program includes recycling pens and markers. A small collection box has been developed to be used in stage classrooms or at other points around schools. Our school drops off used pens, markers, highlighters, and correction tape at designated recycling stations in their stores. These items are then sent to recycling partners who sort, separate, and shred the plastic, which may be used in new products like playgrounds.

### **National Schools Tree Day**

During Term Three the WEN students presented liturgies on **National Schools Tree Day and Season of Creation**.

We celebrated the Schools Tree Day by gifting every student at Holy Cross with a plantable seed card in the shape of a heart with the simple message: **Seeds of Hope,** which ties in nicely with this year's Jubilee theme, **Pilgrims of Hope.** The seeds were collected from our Veggie and Flower Beds, as well as from Mrs Barbuto's herb gardens. The students were encouraged to write a message of hope and promise for their environmental action.

As followers of Christ from around the globe, we are co-creators with God who share a common call to care for all that God has made. Our wellbeing is interwoven with the wellbeing of the Earth. We need to be at **Peace with Creation** and practise what is good for our earth's survival.
